St Ann's is award-winning

We were delighted to win both the Excellence Award and Large Business of the Year at the 2023 Salford Business Awards. 99 fabulous fundraisers joined our August virtual challenge, raising an incredible £15,344.40 by completing 100km in their own way throughout the month. Another successful challenge followed, with supporters completing 5km every day during Hospice Care Week (9th-15th October) in aid of our Build it Together new hospice appeal – thank you to everyone who took part.

Meet our speakers

Some of our speakers at this year's services tell us why Light up a Life is important to them, and what to expect at our services.

Gabriela Belmar-Valencia's mum was a patient at our Little Hulton hospice in May 2022. Gabriela is speaking at Manchester Cathedral. She says: "Those we love never really leave us. We carry them in our hearts for the rest of our lives. But sometimes we need to carve out time and space in our busy lives to sit, reflect and honour them.

"St Ann's Light up a Life is that space. It is a chance for those who said goodbye to our loved ones at St Ann's to come together, and honour not just our loved ones, but the staff who cared for them."





Belinda Neild is also speaking at Manchester Cathedral this year, after going with her family last year.

"The service was so heart-warming; it was really touching being together with so many people that all have shared experiences. Speaking about my mum, father-in-law and other family members who were cared for by St Ann's is important to me to tell people how vital their services are for those who need their help.

"The Light up a Life appeal raises crucial funds that the hospice needs to continue supporting patients and their families. The services bring people together to remember their loved ones at an important time for all families."

Sue Mee is speaking at our Hale service as a long-time supporter of the hospice. Sue says: "My mum spent time at Heald Green and I have now been volunteering at the hospice for 15 years.

"My experience with St Ann's took place 27 years ago but I still remember the excellent care my mum received. It's a place I love and not at all what a lot of people expect a hospice to be like. I'd encourage everyone to support the Light up a Life appeal as St Ann's is vitally needed for the patients and families they support."

It is with great excitement that St Ann's took ownership of land for our new hospice in September, which means building work can start very soon.

The acquisition of the land next door to our current hospice is the latest milestone in the ambitious project to build a new purpose-built hospice to replace the current Victorian building.

Final preparations for commencement are now underway, enabling works are expected to begin in January with clearing of the land, an access road and connection of services the first tasks to get underway. Work will then begin on a 15-month programme to build the new hospice.

St Ann's new hospice will be a complete care facility in Greater Manchester that local people can access, from diagnosis of a life-limiting illness to treatment and beyond.

There are many companies that will be working with the hospice over the project with **Caddick Construction** selected as the main contractor for the building work.

Also part of the team is **Genr8 Developments LLP** - project managers for the new build, architects **PRP** - who has been working with St Ann's for several years to design the building and get to this stage in the project.

The interior design of St Ann's Hospice's new build will be led by **Axi**, who is designing and bringing to life the purpose-built hospice that is much needed by patients and their families.

Also working on the project are cost consultants **Gardner & Theobald**, **TRP** as the structural engineers and **TACE** as the Mechanical and Engineering consultants.

Head of Fundraising and Capital Campaign, Anne-Marie Wynne, says: "We are so excited for the construction and building work to start on the new land, it has been a long time coming! It's brilliant to see so many people coming together after months of planning and preparing, we can't wait to see the new build come to life." our fundraising heroes

Manchester Central helped us to host a huge discount flower sale in September, which raised more than £1,700. It was organised in partnership with Interflora who provided over 75,000 stems from the prestigious Interflora World Cup, which took place in the days before the sale. Manchester Central chose St Ann's as its charity of the year this summer.





Barrie and Claire Hawker, who are local to our Heald Green hospice, embarked on the 96-mile West Highland Way walk this summer – which they completed in just eight days. The couple exceeded their fundraising target and raised over £1,200, rallying friends and family to donate.

Bramall Park Golf Club have been fundraising for St Ann's for 20 years. This year they raised an incredible £19,500 at their annual fundraiser, which will go towards a family room in the new hospice. Our Chief Executive Rachel McMillan and Community Fundraiser Julie Peters visited the club to thank members and receive the donation from Mr Captain Jon Griffin, Lady Captain Brenda Foster and committee members.

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Welcoming everyone at St Ann's

Everyone at St Ann's Hospice works to ensure every day is special for our patients and families, making all feel welcome and included. Rev. Peter O'Brien, Chaplaincy Support Coordinator at St Ann's Hospice, speaks about the importance of equality, diversity and inclusion within our charity.

I have worked at St Ann's Hospice for 14 years, and have seen lots of change take place at the charity to continually increase our inclusion and diversity further; aiming to support all people of religious and non-religious belief. As national guidelines state: chaplaincy care should be available to everyone without discrimination on grounds of age, disability, race, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or any other protected characteristic.

Catering for people from different backgrounds and beliefs is very important to our hospice ethos so that everyone feels welcome and safe.

We're aware that certain groups don't often feel they can gain access to hospice services, but we are always working toward being inclusive and accessible to all our communities. You can read about

how our LGBT+ and Homeless Palliative Care Coordinators have been supporting people from those communities on these pages.

As the Chaplaincy Support Coordinator, it is important to ensure that patients and families know we provide pastoral, spiritual and religious support to *all*. In fact, hospice care is very much holistic, caring for the physical, psychological, social and spiritual needs of those who come through our doors. Staff across St Ann's are always working to ensure everyone feels welcome here, and you can read about how some of my colleagues organised a same-sex blessing for one of our patients on the next page.

Ben's story

People experiencing homelessness are one of a number of groups who often face barriers to accessing palliative care. St Ann's patient Ben* and Heidi McIntyre, Homeless Palliative Care Coordinator, first came into contact over eight years ago.

Ben had problems with drug addiction and his mental health, and had been in and out of hospital. He was admitted to the MRI and put in touch with their homelessness team. Ben was admitted to our Inpatient Unit at Heald Green.

He says: "I can't fault it. If it wasn't for this place, I don't know where I'd be. The staff have been tremendous. I have been treated differently here. Before I felt like they weren't interested in me. But here they've dealt with everything in the right manner, I really appreciate it."



A blessing for Adele and Amanda

Adele and Amanda were engaged to be married when Amanda was suddenly diagnosed with kidney cancer last year. Her health deteriorated quickly and she was admitted to St Ann's in Little Hulton earlier this year, where she was cared for before she died in May, aged just 46.

Amanda wanted to marry Adele while she was at St Ann's. As they were unable to get the paperwork sorted in time, members of staff from The Being You Centre, Inpatient Unit and Catering teams arranged a blessing for the couple in Amanda's room, conducted by the pastor from Salford Royal and complete with a cake, prosecco, flowers and Amanda's parents in attendance.





Empowering the LGBTQ+ community

Siobhan Kenyon, Clinical Educator and LGBT+ Palliative Care Coordinator at St Ann's Hospice, worked with the LGBT Foundation's programme for over 50s, Pride in Ageing, on a unique collaboration resulting in the 'Box of Me' initiative.

'Box of Me' is a creative group workshop for LGBTQ+ adults which invites people to think about the plans they could put in place for the end of their lives. Another group who traditionally face barriers of access to palliative care, the initiative helps to ensure that LGBTQ+ people have their wishes and identity honoured in life and death, reducing potential distress.

Heather

Heather Bennett is our In-Memory and Legacy Fundraiser, and has worked at St Ann's Hospice for the last year. Here, she answers questions about legacy fundraising.

What is legacy giving?

Legacy giving is when a person leaves a gift to a charity in their Will. It is a way people can support the work that we do after they have died, by making a donation to the hospice from their estate in the form of money, buildings or other possessions.

Why is this important?

Legacy fundraising provides vital income for our hospice. One in three of our services are provided by support from legacies so these kinds of donations really do make a huge difference.

Just one percent of someone's estate can make a huge difference

For other beneficiaries of the estate, there are tax benefits when a charitable gift is included.



Legacy donations are a generous act of fundraising that people do to support us, where their legacy in life can live on through their gift to us.

How do I get involved?

All that you need to do to leave a gift is to write in your Will what the gift is, and to confirm it is for St Ann's Hospice and our charity number (258085). It's really straightforward and not the complicated process some people might think it is.
